Analysis/Interpretation (Consideration):

Students proved adept at this PSLO exhibiting the integration of faith and learning. Students were encouraged to consider the definition of *Christian* literature challenging their preconceived notions. While ELL students are well-versed in evaluating the literary significance and influence of an author's work, these courses allowed exploration of the cultural relevance of *Christian* literature specifically, judging not only their literary merit but theology as well.

Action Plan (Use):

The ELL program contains Christian Literature classes (LIT 353- Biblical Literature & Its Contemporary Counterparts, OLT 313- Psalms & Wisdom Literature), these courses often fall under the Literature Elective category and may not be selected. Analysis/Interpretation (Consideration):

The capstone project represents a significant endeavor exhibiting the skill and knowledge gleaned over the entirety of the ELL program. Identifying a research topic, conducting preliminary research to vet and narrow the topic, and meeting incremental deadlines are challenging tasks under the best of circumstances. With the reality of COVID-19 and the move to online instruction, the challenge was more pressing.

The effects of social isolation, course materials left on campus, and the uncertainty of the semester derailed momentum periodically. Ultimately the challenge was met with enthusiasm, and the final product exceeded expectations.

Action Plan (Use):

This semester certainly underscores the importance of investigating and identifying the research topic prior to the start of the students' final semester. Also, moving the due date for the rough draft earlier in the semester would facilitate stress-free revision and the final submission.

Analysis/Interpretation (Consideration):

COM 123 Informative Speech: Students are still having difficulty being creative in their introductions. Also, it was difficult to discern the main points since they were not in the controlling idea and transition was lacking throughout the speech. Students fail to understand the influence of professional dress that is appropriate for the situation. In today's society, role models for this may be deficient or missing.

ENG 123 Research Paper: The professors felt the students are doing fairly well on the research paper. One possible reason is the three research essays that are required before the final 8-page paper. This gets them used to citations and also using resources. The research paper unit was structured with incremental research-based assignments which allowed students to complete the paper in stages. All 25 categories in the rubric met the 70% or better benchmark. At times several were encouraged to change topics when they discovered a lack of available quality sources because of the topic chosen whether too current or too broad. The results for the online section of ENG 123 are better than the seated courses as far as grades for the paper possibly since a majority of the students were academically strong dual enrollment students.

ENG 123: Final Exam For ENG 123A we had 4 D's on the exam; whereas, in the other two 15 week sections, we had no D's. This made a significant difference in reaching our benchmark. If this pattern continues, we will again start to compile a spreadsheet on each question missed on the exam.

Action Plan (Use):

COM 123 Informative Speech: The rubric for appearance has as a criterion "pleasing." Perhaps the wording of this component of the rubric needs to be more specific.

ENG 123 Research Paper: The professors were pleased with the results but want to develop a methodology for the students to choose a more appropriate topic that has adequate resources. Perhaps an interest survey to complete would help broaden their choice of topics. Changing the working bibliography to annotated ensure students do not just copy down a source list but actually evaluate the sources.

ENG 123: Final Exam: Compile a spreadsheet of the number of students in each class that missed each question. This was done in the past, and we always met our final exam benchmark in all classes. If the benchmark is not met again, the analytical spreadsheet will have to be compiled next year.

Analysis/Interpretation (Consideration):

This aspect of GESLO 2 does not include the technology courses, which are assessed separately.

IL Quiz: The students met the benchmark in the fall (88%) and the spring (80%); however, after evaluating the questions missed by the four classes, the professors decided to look at those questions where less than 70% had the correct answer. Of the 9 out of 25 questions that fell in this category, 3 were revised. The percentages were was above the 75% benchmark despite in the fall 5% did not attempt the quiz and in the spring 7% did not attempt the quiz.

Project SAILS: Project SAILS was administered to the seniors this year. Next year the survey is administered to the freshmen. Unfortunately, the results are given to the University once the bill is paid. There was a slight hold up in the payment to the company, so the results will be available later in June. One concern for the seniors taking the survey is that there must be at least 50 to obtain results from Project SAILS company. We had to be creative in reaching that number since we were about 6-7 seniors short. The Librarian sent emails to seniors who did not participate, and we managed to reach 50 students. The venue was also quite informal in the Anvil (coffeehouse like atmosphere) which could have led to several students not completing their survey unbeknownst to the professors proctoring the survey until later when the results were tabulated.

Technology Courses: After speaking with the Digital Media Department. With the nature of the courses below being completely specific to the Digital Media major, they do not quite fulfill the requirement of General Education defined in GESLO. It would be in the committees best interest to remove these courses form the list of technology courses assessed.

Did not meet the benchmark, Small class size with 5. 3/5 achieved. Primarily it was Covid related. At the end of the semester a 3 hour night class and no equipment made this course very difficult. If we were in class it could have been really different.

MTN263 - Digital Audio 85% of students will meet the standard.

Three different sections. Benchmark was met in all but the Spring semester. The short fall was due to Covid. The hardware and software was not available and students were not able to complete final projects adequately.

DIG272 - Intro to Web Design 85% of students will meet the standard.

Practical ExamBenchmark was met 1 student did not attempt. Students were required to find answers to coding problems. Everyone did a great job on this one. This is the first time Mel implemented practice exams before doing the final practical exams.

DIG243 - Intro to Photography 85% of students will meet the standard.

No classes met the benchmark which was very surprising. This has not taken place in 10 years. 1 semester Freshman year was a big change and the quality of students was not there. The Freshman had a hard time managing a large project at the end of the semester. In one section in the Fall I had 62% not meet the benchmark. 4 did not attempt. It wasn't that the students did not know how to operate the camera, they just did not put in the time or effort. In the Spring. No Digital Media Students and only upperclassmen. 1 person did not attempt. I think he is going to follow through. I did have 4 people that only partially met the requirements.

Action Plan (Use):

IL Quiz: After analyzing the questions, the professors and the librarian reworded 3 of the 25 questions, mainly dealing with the choice options. Students may have been confused by the wording of "Library Online Category" which was changed to "UVF Library Catalog." The professors of ENG 123 will administer the revised IL quiz in fall 2020 and spring 2021.

Project SAILS: The survey will be given to freshmen in ENG 123 in 2020-2021, so there will be no problem reaching 50 students. For 2021-2022, a more formal venue for seniors needs to be chosen. Also, the invoice should be given to the Business Department as early as possible after the survey is taken.



Analysis/Interpretation (Consideration):

- 1. "Not attempted category" is helpful to distinguish between students who are not meeting the benchmark due to a lack of understanding of the material in contrast to those who are not meeting the benchmark due to a lack of trying/motivation.
- 2. However, in light of #1 above, notice should be given to the issue of students' financial difficulties and the UVF policy of locking students out of my.valleyforge as part of the financial policies of the college. Note the comment above from OLT123A Fall 2019: "Of this 7 (who did not attempt the quiz), 6 of the students had significant disengagement from the course as evidenced by missing several assignments, with 5 of them experiencing some disruption to their my.valleyforge access, in addition to their disengagement."
- 3. The MLT department will re-visit the content of the course material and assessment quizzes in light of the Program Review currently underway and in light of the new AG credentialing exams in Bible and Theology. Note this would also align with "Use of Results" OLT123: Fall 2019: "As I review some of the questions, I believe the quiz could be updated somewhat to more adequately reflect the overarching themes of the course."
- 4. Student success appears to be linked to the teaching styles of the various professors and courses as evidenced by the benchmarks being met and the data being consistent between the GESLO assessment and the overall grades in the other assignments as noted above in:
 - 1. NWT113A Fall 2019: "Through the presentation and review of a study-guide, I believe that the students were well prepared for both the mid-term and final exam."
 - 2. NWT113BX: Fall 2019: "The students were well prepared by the readings, the weekly writing assignments and the study sheets provided. Being a survey course, the course offers a broad scope of information so the study sheets help the students focus their studying."
 - 3. NWT113A: Spring 2020: "These results correlate with the overall course grades, which were additionally impacted by a Discovery Learning project that involved written discoveries drawn from all 27 Books of the New Testament."

Action Plan (Use):

- 1. The department and university may want to consider how to better motivate students in their overall academic pursuit.
- 2. The University may want to consider collecting data noting the correspondence between students in the "not attempted" category and "not met" category to determine the academic impact on the students experiencing disruption to their my.valleyforge access due to financial considerations. Historically there have been correlations between students with financial difficulties and students who fail to persist in their education. If it is determined that there is a correlation between students in the "not attempted" and "not met" categories and their access to my.valleyforge being disrupted due to financial issues, perhaps the University should re-consider its policies and approaches to students' financial aid issues or provide more consistent guidelines to faculty regarding how to handle missed work due to lock-out issues.
- 3. The MLT department will re-visit the content of the course material and assessment quizzes in light of the Program Review currently underway and in light of the new AG credentialing exams in Bible and Theology.
- 4. Faculty should continue with these teaching strategies to ensure that the benchmarks will continue to be met.



Analysis/Interpretation (Consideration):

110/123 =89% of students enrolled in PHE Health and Physical activity courses completed the benchmarks set for them. The fall had less students (47) and saw 91% reach the benchmark versus the spring (76) and had 88% reach it.

PHE Varsity benchmark was 1% shy of reaching the 95% benchmark (33/35). The only reason the PHE varsity sports do not reach 100% is because of students not responded to the proper withdraw prompts that were given.

The PHE non-varsity class benchmark (85%) was met at 27/30 (90%). However, the PHE 233, seated course offered in the morning has seen the least successful outcomes between the few non varsity options.

The spring assessment of PHE Nutrition and Health Diet Analysis Assessment - reached 86% which does meet the 85% benchmark set which is a considerable increase from the past years (58%).

Action Plan (Use):

Continue to find ways to work with the registrar and student-athletes that quit teams to withdraw from the PHE varsity sport.

Discuss the time of day (8:55 am Tuesday and Thursday) PHE 233 seated course is offered.

Brainstorm new PHE non-varsity sport options that would excite students.



Analysis/Interpretation (Consideration):

The goal of 80% meeting the benchmark was not met in either fall (67%) or spring (73%). Three history professors were adjuncts although it is hard to discern if that had any influence on the outcome. The rest of the professors were full-time. Just in the history classes alone 10 students did not attempt the essay, so that skewed the results of those that actually did the assignment. Also, this GESLO has classes from psychology, philosophy, history, and social sciences, 15 classes for fall and 13 classes for spring.

Perhaps these professors need to meet to discuss the rubric and weaknesses in the students' assignment although a modified rubric was made two years ago.

Action Plan (Use):

Hopefully, a convenient time can be found for the professors to meet to discuss the results of the assessment. This covers two departments, Arts and Sciences and Behavioral Sciences.

The "not attempted" component of the results has been discussed in the past, but no decision as to an action plan has been made. This needs to be brought up in a GESLO meeting before the assessment begins in fall 2020.



Analysis/Interpretation (Consideration):

Overall 85% of the students met or exceeded the standard compared to the benchmark of 80% of students meeting or exceeding the standards for the statistics exam and for the new Course Evaluation Learning Essentials Question 13. Students generally did well on the statistics exam but had some difficulty with the multipart questions in some cases. Professors noted that this exam is unique compared to other exams in that computations are not needed to interpret and evaluate graphics in the exam questions and that it is possible for a student who does not understand the topic see patterns and even memorizes responses if they repeated the questions multiple times.

This is the first semester that UVF has used IDEA Learning Essentials Questions as an indirect measure of student learning. Results of student self-assessment of their learning were positive, with most student rating their learning in the top two categories in a 1-5 Likert scale. We noted that the results of the exams and the Learning Essential Question responses were in line with each other.

Action Plan (Use):

We plan to continue to use and evaluate the IDEA Learning Essentials Questions in future courses.

We plan to experiment with other questions in the homework and test sets to see if any improvements in the exam question sets can be found that would test the same objectives, but either add a computational element. These questions could be added to the exam question set next time it is used.



Analysis/Interpretation (Consideration):

The benchmark was met when the results of those students submitting work are considered. For students who submitted work 88% (45/51) scored in the meets or exceeds range compared to the benchmark of 80% of students falling in this range. However, 19 students of 63 total students (19%) did not complete the assessment (that is they did not take the Nature of Science (NOS) Quiz or, in the case of the scientific analysis paper, they did not submit work). Interestingly, about 26% (5/19) students that did not take the NOS quiz were in one section, where the professor noted that a possible solution was allowing time in class after the topic was discussed would likely improve results compared to allowing students to take it online over a wider range of time.

With respect to the paper, some professors noted that students had the most difficulty understanding the difference between primary and secondary sources. This reduced scores of some students in the research section of the rubric. Others noted that more in-class instruction about the requirements of the paper might be needed.

Action Plan (Use):

In general results in GESLO for Natural Science were similar to past semesters. Overall the sections of the science courses student who submitted work generally were able to meet the benchmark, but it was also noted that helping students understand the expectations of the assignment (especially the paper) and expectations of how and when to complete the Nature of Science Quiz will benefit future students. There were several additional best practices and ideas for future improvements that can be shared with faculty teaching science. For example, clarifying expectations for the paper by using class (or video) time to help them understand the expectations and rubric, sharing examples of excellent papers, providing deadlines to have topics approved, and perhaps adding some additional topics to generate more interest the paper.

Although students met the benchmarks for Graduate PSLO 2, in the fall semester some did struggle with statistical procedures in preparation for their research projects. We are very pleased, however, with the quality of the final research papers that were written in the spring semester, in spite of the fact that some graduate students had a few issues with mechanics, sentence structure, and the ability to write in formal prose. Compared to last year, however, this is much improved. Evidence indicates that the instructor included lessons that reviewed how to locate articles using academic databases, how to summarize/abstract articles, and weekly group discussions of students' literature reviews.



Analysis/Interpretation (Consideration):

In the fall we normally assess MUS 600's Applied Music Jury evaluations, and in the spring we assess MUS 010 Recital Hour- Upper Divisional Exam. Due to COVID-19, however, we were unable to complete the Upper Division Exam this semester. Consequently, based on the data collected, analyzed, and discussed for the fall 2019 semester, we are pleased with the results of the data for the applied jury exams. The majority of students are practicing a minimum of 50 hours for the semester, with many students exceeding this requirement. The strong results of the jury exams reflect the number of hours students are practicing on their instruments.

Action Plan (Use):

On August 14, 2020, the Department Chair will hold a meeting with all applied music instructors. At this meeting, the Chair will include a review the strong results of the jury exams, and remind faculty to continue keeping their students accountable in terms of their practice hours. We feel this is a critical area for our students, since proficiency on their instruments will be necessary for their success in their chosen areas of concentration.
